Dental Training Vision Renewed

As Islamic radicalism expands, we, as followers of Jesus know what the true solution is. Jesus' servants in missions across the world can have a powerful impact for the Gospel as we humbly immerse ourselves in helping suffering humanity in practical service. Tooth decay afflicts billions causing great suffering in the world. Dental pain is one of the worse; ask anyone who couldn't sleep at night because of it.

Our vision has always been to train "trainers" so dental care, in Jesus name, would multiply in the world. Well that is now more attainable than ever. Why? Silver Nitrate therapy—a simple therapy that halts dental decay in its tracks. Its simplicity and economy greatly facilitate replication. Imagine the potential in relieving human suffering this could bring. It could open the flood-gates to train thousands of dental techs across the globe. All things are possible with God.

Senegal, West Africa

In November, I was so blessed to return to Senegal again after eight years. I was welcomed with much affection from my former team—quite overwhelming at times. Each of my six days was like a roller-coaster of activity. But the best thing was being with my old friends again. At times it felt like I never left. My purpose in going was to bring dental education updates, evaluate the clinic, encourage the team and offer suggestions to help make things better. Bend, Oregon

In December, God opened a way for me to fly to Seattle, WA, then drive with Jason and his wife Meggan—partners in our mission, across the Cascades to east central Oregon. We went to meet with Dr. John Frachella, an expert and pioneer in Silver Nitrate treatment. Dr. Frachella has much experience with this technique in which he uses the same material we already use in A.R.T. He, along with others, is on a mission to change the "standard of care" in caries treatment in America. We spent two days going over his methodology in detail. His collaborator, Dr. Steve Duffin (also a pioneer and scientist) kindly told me to consider myself part of their team. What on honor! They respect my dental experiences in training nationals in developing nations using A.R.T. Dr. Duffin started a project in Ghana W. Africa called "No DK." (DK=decay) based on Silver Nitrate therapy. This trip solidified my acceptance of this new therapy for our program.

Matamoros, Mexico

It was very important to me that I promptly start applying silver nitrate therapy for myself in a clinical setting. So I scheduled clinics at two churches in Mexico. This has helped me to make the adjustment of integrating A.R.T. with the simpler and quicker treatment of dental decay, now called S.M.A.R.T. (Silver Modified Atraumatic Restorative Treatment). Immediately, I saw a dramatic increase in productivity; patients were coming and going much more quickly.

Two faithful members at "Fe Y Poder" Church (Faith and Power) signed on as my first students in our new course—Ruth, the pastor's daughter and mother of three; and Diego, manning the air pump in the photo. He is a dedicated young man with a servant heart. He and Ruth are very excited about providing dental care in their church. They also want to serve and train members of other churches. I'm looking forward to start their training in April.



Denver, CO

I've put the final proofing of my new book on hold for a time so I could meet the pressing needs of the dental ministry. However, in January, I was flown to a planning session for a conference on God's infinite love for all to be held at "The Sanctuary Downtown," Denver. The church is pastored by Peter Hiett, a respected pastor and Bible teacher. Philip Yancey writes: "Week in, week out, Peter Hiett is one of the best teachers I have ever heard." Anchorage, Alaska

As well, in January, Jason flew to Anchorage to hold a silver nitrate seminar with two physicians and an influential dentist interested in this treatment. Their interest is geared towards isolated regions in the context of the First Nations population. I coached him and sent him the supplies he needed for the meeting. He had a great experience. It's possible he may have paved the way for a state-wide approval of this therapy. Time will tell.

Omaha, Nebraska

In February, Jason and I also traveled to Omaha together to meet with Dr. Mark Manhart. He is another pioneer dentist who has made a great discovery. He has found great success in a simple, inexpensive treatment for gum disease. We both read his autobiography, *Open Wide*, which explains in detail how he made this finding.

We spent two days learning his methods in detail. This is a superior therapy for advanced gum disease which avoids gum surgery and its serious consequences, not even an option for most of the world's people. I have always felt frustrated that we couldn't do more for those suffering from severe gum disease. Dr. Manhart is excited to help us bring this therapy to the developing world.

Democratic Republic of Congo

Associates of our mission, Luke Fisher and his wife Chante, came to Texas to spend some time with me getting updated in silver nitrate treatment preparing for their return to Congo March 1. They work in a very remote region. We discussed various dental subjects related to their work including their activities and plans for the future working closely with us.

I demonstrated new instrumentation I've developed recently and gave them needed supplies. We had a good time of sharing and encouraging each other. Luke is supervising 16 dental techs he has trained (mostly government nurses) working in health posts in their region.



Periogen

Since our last letter, I've continued searching for solutions to the periodontal challenges we face as you saw above with Dr. Manhart. Frankly, I find it hard to believe that the only way to gingival health is to have someone scrape our teeth with a metal instrument every 3-6 months. This has been bothering me for a long time, especially in light of the developing world where such services are not available, nor are they affordable when they are available.

One solution I am optimistic about is Periogen, a product many insists "dissolves" tartar. Doug and John Anderson (the inventors) attests scientific support for this claim.* I've had two lengthy conversations with John Anderson and he was very helpful. He donated 50 bottles to our mission, worth \$1500 if sold individually. Luke brought half of them to Congo a couple weeks ago. I will keep you posted on this exciting development. Root Canals

I've been thinking how great it would be if we could save severely decayed front teeth with root canal treatment. It means so much to a person to have a nice smile; who wants missing front teeth? So I bought an up-to-date root canal textbook and also a practical clinical manual to learn what the current treatments are. There's two encouraging studies, one in <u>Brazil</u> and another in <u>Gambia</u> which have had good success training non-dentists without the need for x-rays. Root canals might be feasible for us on front teeth because of the ease of access, good visibility and the fact they only have one root to disinfect and fill.

We have scheduled a Skype session with Dr. Manhart, (mentioned above) this week. He seems very willing to teach us his simplified technique. This may be a long shot, but it is certainly worth investigating. Please pray that God give us wisdom.
